Capitalization Cheat Sheet

- 1. **Headings.** Avoid ALL CAPS unless court rules require them. Instead, capitalize every word unless it is a preposition that has fewer than five letters (of, with), a conjunction (and, or), or an article (a, an, or the). Also capitalize an article, conjunction, or preposition if it is the first word or the last word, or if it follows a dash or a colon.
- 2. **Party affiliations.** Lowercase party affiliations (*defendant*, *plaintiff*, *appellant*) unless you're referring to the parties in the current dispute. Either way, skip the articles: "*Defendant* has failed to show" Not: "*The* Defendant."
- 3. **Courts.** Lowercase *court* unless you're referring to the U.S. Supreme Court or to the court you're addressing in your document.
- 4. **Federal, state, commonwealth.** Lowercase these words unless the word they modify is capitalized (*Federal Reserve*), they are part of a title (*Commonwealth of Virginia*), or you're referring to a party. You should thus lowercase "state law" and "federal law."
